
Small classroom, seats around 35 – can be used for overflow meeting room for largely attended meetings; complete with projection system and 75" HDTV

Written directions (if needed) to the new BVRC meeting venue at ALETA:

From the north: Southbound on I-49, take Exit 77 (exit for AR-612). Follow AR-612 freeway to the end of freeway, which will be AR-112. At end of offramp turn left, crossover AR-612, and go south on AR-112. Then, go about ¾ mile and take first available left onto Carrie Smith Road. Then, stay straight (east) on Carrie Smith, and stay straight for about 1½ miles, and road will then zig and zag (SLOW DOWN! SHARP CURVES!), and change names to Downum Road. You will now be going south. Continue for about 500 feet and ALETA building will be on your left. (See sign in front of bldg.)

From the south: Northbound on I-49, take Exit 73 (Elm Springs Road exit). At end of offramp, turn left. You will cross over I-49 and see McDonald's and Wal-Mart Supercenter on your right and Macadoodles on your left. Continue straight (west) on Elm Springs Road. You will then go about 1½ miles and Elm Springs Road will make a sharp curve to the right (north). Then, go to the next curve – which will curve left – but at this curve do not follow it to the left, but veer off Elm Springs road to the right. You will see a small blue sign "Arkansas Law Enforcement Training Academy ↑". You will now be on Pinkley Road. Stay straight on Pinkley Road for about ½ mile to stop sign. Turn left (this is County Line Road), and go about ¼ mile and take the next available right – Downum Road. Proceed north on Downum Road for about ¼ mile, and ALETA building will be on the right. (See sign in front of bldg.)

THE FIELD DAY COORDINATOR ROLE IS CONSIDERABLE, BUT YOU WILL FIND THAT FOR SUCH A SPECIAL EVENT AS FIELD DAY, THERE ARE MANY CLUB MEMBERS WHO ARE MORE THAN WILLING TO LEND A HELPING HAND. A 'FIELD DAY PLANNER' SPREADSHEET IS ALSO AVAILABLE TO HELP YOU DELEGATE THE VARIOUS DUTIES.

For this month, BVRC President Tom Northfell has submitted two captivating QSLs that were also ATNOs (All-Time New Ones) for him:



FOØ / TX, Marquesas Islands – This DXpedition was extra thrilling to work, as Arkansas' own Bill Priakos – W5SJ from Fort Smith (3rd from the left and who gave a great program for us in January 2019) was on the team. The islands constitute a group of around 10 islands in the southern Pacific Ocean. They are under the sovereignty of France and the total population is near 10,000. They are located about 1,370 miles from Tahiti. The average yearly high there is around 85° and the average low is around 75°. Tom was very excited when he heard them acknowledge his callsign around 2353 UTC on Nov. 10, 2019.

VP6, Pitcairn Island – This is one of the most remote islands to travel to on the planet. Only a lone supply ship visits the island about every two weeks and there are only 47 inhabitants that reside there (as of 2021). They are biracial people that are the descendants of the nine Bounty mutineers and a handful of Tahitian consorts from Tahiti that fled there and hid from the British Royal Navy, after they commandeered the ship in 1789. The island is the only island in the Pacific Ocean owned by Great Britain. Tom worked the 2019 DXpedition that were there for about two weeks on Oct. 31, 2019, on 17-meters. (Nice Halloween present.)



BVRC NEEDS THREE VOLUNTEERS FOR OPEN CHAIR POSITIONS

Bella Vista Radio Club is submitting a call-out for anyone in the Club who would like to contribute to our organization and our hobby in an off-air function regarding three important positions: Public Information Officer, Emergency Communications Chairperson, and Social Media Coordinator.

Ham radio can be very rewarding while working the bands, but it is also rewarding while serving off the air in helping the Club and its members.

PUBLIC INFORMATION OFFICER

The primary responsibility of the PIO is to work with local news media to keep them advised and updated with various Club activities. This is normally limited to local and area newspapers (weeklies, and the NWA Democrat-Gazette), but expanded to include radio and television for our annual ARRL Field Day, and other major or unusual events.

This includes monthly meetings, special events, special speakers or projects, and especially the Club's participation in the annual ARRL Field Day. The PIO writes and distributes news releases in advance of meetings and events, and for events in which no news coverage is received, the PIO

may prepare follow-up summaries with digital photos of the event. Whenever the news media does cover Club meetings or events, the PIO serves as the Club's primary spokesperson, and/or arranges with a Club officer to be interviewed, make suggestions for photography or interview topics.

Ideally, the PIO should possess above grammar, spelling and writing skills, and capable of occasionally preparing multimedia programs and speaking to community clubs and organizations.

If you would like to meet members of the NW Arkansas TV and newspaper community along with many operators in our NW Arkansas populace, and you possess nominal speaking and article composing skill, this position is for you. Our past PIOs have had a ball in serving in this position, as it is WELL worthwhile in the fun and enjoyment it entails.

EMERGENCY COMMUNICATION CHAIRPERSON

This position is geared for ham operators who enjoy preparing, and showing others how to

prepare, to set-up and operate a portable station in the event of a tornado, flood, or earthquake in **EmComm** our area. would Chairperson duties include emergency station setoperation, uр and traffic knowledge handling, of VHF/UHF repeater locations and the operation. possible assistance in the area of communication for local foot and bicycle races, and other related areas.

If you think you would like to serve and help other hams in this sphere, please contact any of the Club officers.

SOCIAL MEDIA COORDINATOR

If you're an avid user and enjoyer of Facebook, why not devote some of that time to spreading the word about ham radio on BVRC's Facebook page?

GET READY TO PARTICIPATE IN THE SSB ARRL ROOKIE ROUNDUP!!!

The ARRL Rookie Roundup is a contest aimed at amateurs who have been licensed for three years or less. This six-hour event is held three times per year (April for SSB, August for RTTY, and December for CW). The Rookie Roundup for SSB (microphone) this year is on April 10, 2022.

As we do for each year, several of our BVRC experienced operators will be welcoming you into their shacks to host this event. If you presently do not have HF privileges and/or do not have an HF station, you can still operate from one of the experienced operator's locations and enjoy & learn the fun world of HF! You will also learn the fun of logging contacts. (The experienced operator will be there as a Coach and control operator for you, but they are not allowed to operate or log... YOU will do the operating!)

You will be using a callsign chosen by your control operator, but if your station wins in one of the categories, you will win a certificate with <u>your</u> callsign on it:


3) You might feel better!

Please enjoy Steve's articles, as they are guaranteed to be informative and very helpful to you.

Repurposing Old PL-259 Connectors

Ham radio operators will eventually need to replace coax cable or bad coax connectors from the normal wear-and-tear on the antenna system, and the PL-259 connectors are usually trashed because it is usually difficult to re-use them. However, the nut on the old PL-259 connector is worth keeping for many applications in your ham radio hobby. See Figure 1.

The PL-259 nut (coupling shell) has a 5/8 inch 24 tpi standard thread, and this is the same nut size used in circular microphone connectors and N-Type coax connectors. If you seal up the back end of the PL-259 nut, it will make an excellent connector protector for things like feed throughs, antenna analyzers, microphone jacks, and etc. The back end of the connector can be sealed with

with a commercial snap-in plastic or metal plug, or it can be plugged with a washer and RTV. See Figure 2.




Figure 6 – A PL-259 nut cut down for a make-shift jam nut. The nut can be cut down to whatever length is required for your application.

The PL-259 nut can also be cut down with a hack saw for a make-shift jam nut on feed through barrels. See Figure 6.


